

MESSAGE FROM THE PROVOST



ABOUT THE COLLEGE OF HUMANITIES

1. History and Establishment

The College of Humanities is one of four colleges established under the University of Ghana's Collegiate System of Management, which was adopted in the 2014/2015 academic year to decentralise the administration of academic programmes within the university. The new colleges created under the collegiate system of administration are: the College of Health Sciences (CHS), the College of Basic and Applied Sciences (CBAS), the College of Education (COE) and the College of Humanities (COH), which is the largest of the four.

2. Profile

The College of Humanities (COH) comprises six schools: the University of Ghana Business School (UGBS), School of Arts, School of Performing Arts, School of Languages, School of Social Sciences, and the University of Ghana School of Law. It is also home to four research institutes: the Institute of Statistical, Social and Economic Research (ISSER); the Institute of African Studies (IAS), the Regional Institute for Population Studies (RIPS) and the Maria Sibylla Merian Institute for Advanced Studies in Africa (MIASA); as well as ten centres: the Centre for Social Policy Studies (CSPS), the Language Centre, the Legon Centre for International Affairs and Diplomacy (LECIAD), the Center for Gender Studies and Advocacy (CEGENSA), the Centre for Migration Studies (CMS), the Centre for European Studies (CES), the Centre for Urban Management Studies (CUMS), the Centre for Asian Studies (CAS), the Centre for Latin American Studies (CLAS), and the Centre for Ageing Studies (CFAS). 



Figure 2: Percentage of Total University Disability Enrolment at Different Programme Levels Accounted for by the College of Humanities



Figure 3: Percentage of Total University Employees by Rank Accounted for by the College of Humanities





YEAR IN REVIEW

Office of the Provost, Schools, Institutes and Centres



1. Overview of the Office of the Provost



The Office of the Provost of the College of Humanities (CoH), University of Ghana oversees and supports the community of faculty, students and staff of the College, and their shared values, by providing resources and infrastructure that encourage them to pursue excellence at every level. Together with the Deans and Directors of the College's 6 schools, 10 centres and 4 research institutes, the Office of the Provost provides leadership to advance the academic and administrative goals of the College in line with the intellectual and social ambitions of the University of Ghana. The Office works in collaboration with other key offices within the College to ensure the smooth management and day to day running of the College. These offices include the College Finance Office, the College Academic Office, the College Procurement and Facilities Management Office and the College Communications Office.

MAIDEN RETREAT FOR THE COLLEGE OF HUMANTIES SECRETARIAT HELD AT THE ROYAL SENCHI HOTEL AND RESORT, AKOSOMBO

The maiden College of Humanities retreat was held from Thursday August 25 to Saturday, August 27, 2022 at the Royal Senchi Hotel and Resort, Akosombo. The purpose of the retreat was to provide College officers with an opportunity to reflect on the day-today work of the College, create an opportunity for networking and for groups to develop Standard Operating Procedures for work in the College. Out of a total of 32 members of the College Secretariat who were required to attend the retreat, 27 of them were present, representing an 84% attendance rate, including two National Service Personnel.





The Day 1 activities comprised a presentation on the College of Humanities within the UG Strategic Priorities and the Vice-Chancellor's Key Strategic Objectives (KSOs) along with an overview of the Provost's Strategic Areas (PSAs) and the role of College constituents. This was done by the Provost. Speaking to a powerpoint presentation, the Provost run participants through the University of Ghana Strategic Plan 2014-2024 and its linkage with the Vice-Chancellor's Key Strategic Objectives (KSOs) and consequently, the Provost's Strategic areas. From these, the Provost unveiled his Strategic Areas (PSAs) as Governance Management, Regulatory Requirements, Revenue Mobilisation, Ownership & Commitment, Visibility and Web presence, Technology, Gender, Academics, Research, Internal and External Stakeholders. He highlighted the link between the three and encouraged members to monitor timelines, provide effective and efficient leadership in their constituencies and be professional in the discharge of their duties. Subsequently, the College Secretary, Mrs. Mavis Otoo-Ayeh gave a

presentation on the development of Standard Operating Procedures (SoPs). Using a template from the University of Ghana, she took members through the SOP drafting process. Next the College Communications Coordinator, Dr. Sheena Lovia Boateng gave a presentation on the communications and visibility of the College. She enlightened the team about the College Communications Office's relevance towards achieving the Provost's goals, stressing the role and importance of branding. The Provost then shared his thoughts on Professional Development Planning (PDP) and Personal SWOT analysis.

He stressed that the keys to personal development are Interest and Competence, because if one will succeed, it will be through what one does; and no one does well in something they find no interest in. Members then had the opportunity to hold optional meetings with the Provost to discuss their professional development plans. Members who took advantage of this opportunity included both Senior and Junior Staff and National Service Personnel. Then came Day 2. The activities for Day 2 included the plenary development of SoPs by groups/ teams of members created to discuss and develop Standard Operating Procedure (SoP) documents based on the schedules of their respective offices including the General Administration Office, the Academic Office, the Finance Office , the Procurement and Facilities Management Office and the Human Resource (Senior Member Academic) unit. During the plenary session, the Provost and College Secretary took turns to participate in each group's meeting and share some thoughts to shape the development of their SoPs. None of the members of the Human Resource (Senior and Junior Staff) unit was present,

hence they could not meet.









A virtual presentation on 'Mental Health/Emotional Intelligence' was then given by Rev. Dr. Joseph Otwey Buabeng of the Careers and Counselling Centre of the University of Ghana. Members were taken through the three domains of mental health namely, the Cognitive; Emotional; and Behavioural Domains and how they affect individual behaviours. Our emotional experiences, he said, are crucial to our mental health since they foster our personal integration and can also serve as a disorganizing factor in personality disintegration. Following from the discussion on mental health and emotional intelligence, Mr. Alex Crabbe, the College Management Accountant presented on financial and budgetary matters. Members were exposed to the budgeting process, challenges associated with budgeting and the role of budget holders at the University of Ghana. On the third and final day, some members participated in aerobics activities led by the College Secretary while others participated in some leisure activities prior to the departure from the venue.


COLLEGE OF HUMANITIES HOLDS MAIDEN COLLEGE AWARDS CEREMONY



On Saturday, 25th February 2023, the University of Ghana School of Law emerged triumphant in the just ended National Round of the Jessup International Moot Court Competition, which was presided by His Lordship Nene Amegatcher, Justice of the Supreme Court, Ghana. The University of Ghana School of Law is currently the two-time consecutive champion of the National Round of the JESSUP International Moot Court Competition. A team of five (5) students from the University of Ghana School of Law, represented Ghana at the White & Case Jessup International Law Moot Court Competition in Washington DC, USA. The competition began on Monday, 10th April 2023 at the Hyatt Regency Washington Hotel.



Nine (9) universities from the USA, India, Indonesia, France and Ghana who won the national round of the Jessup International Moot Court Competitions were present at the international round in Washington DC. The participating universities included Columbia University, Sciences Po, Campus Europe – Asie au Havre, Lexington University (Kentucky), The Tamil Nadu Dr. Ambedkar Law University – School of Excellence in LawCase Western Reserve University, Bryce University, Airlangga University and the University of Ghana School of Law. The Ghanaian team aced the oral advocacy round, which formed the first part of the competition with outstanding scores but could, however, not make it through the competition. The Philip C. Jessup International Law Moot Court Competition, also known as the Jessup Moot or the Jessup is the world's largest moot court competition, with participants from roughly 700 law schools in 100 countries and jurisdictions. The Jessup Competition allows participants to broaden their knowledge in research and familiarize themselves with materials outside the scope of what they have been taught in their law faculties. 
LEBANESE COMMUNITY IN GHANA AWARDS TWELVE (12) STUDENTS OF UGSOL WITH SCHOLARSHIPS

UGSOL HOLDS INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON AFRICA DATA PROTECTION LAWS

The University of Ghana School of Law in collaboration with the University of Passau in Germany, and with support from the German Embassy in Ghana is set to establish a knowledge hub - African Data Protection Law and Policy Centre, a centre for in-depth study of issues concerning data in the African context. In his address, Prof. Raymond A. Atuguba, Dean of the University of Ghana School of Law noted that the creation of the African Data Protection Law and Policy Centre would allow researchers to examine the plaguing issues surrounding data collection and its use in Africa and prescribe directives in line with their findings to contribute toward policy creation in the area of Data Protection.





Pro Vice-Chancellor responsible Academic and Students Affairs at the University of Ghana, Prof. Gordon A. Awandare, who represented the Vice-Chancellor noted that the primary focus of the African Data Protection Law and Policy Centre would be research, policy development and training on the regulation and protection of personal and non-personal data in Africa, Madam Patricia Adusei-Poku, Executive Director and Commissioner of the Data Protection Commission, expressed excitement about Ghana's initiative to set up a centre focused on Data Protection in Africa. She added that it will contribute to Ghana's digitalisation process and the provision of ethical solutions to data protection and governance.

The German Ambassador to Ghana, Daniel Krull, was elated with the upcoming project and the benefits it had for the African continent and resounded Germany's support for the project. The African Data Protection Laws: Regulation, Practice and Policy Conference, was a 3-day conference which sought to shed light on issues regarding Data Protection in Africa and to find self-sustaining ways to improve on existent issues in the area of data protection. The conference also served as a platform for the launch of the Centre for African Data Law and Policies at the University of Ghana School of Law.

SCHOOL OF LANGUAGES COMMEMORATES UNESCO'S INTERNATIONAL MOTHER LANGUAGE DAY

The School of Languages, on Tuesday, 21st February 2023, held a one-day symposium commemorating UNESCO's International Mother Language Day, an annual celebration that falls on the 21st of February every year. This year's event was hosted by the School of Languages in collaboration with the Ghana Commission for UNESCO under the theme "Mother Tongue for National Development", with detailed academic presentations from top scholars and cultural experts in the field indigenous Ghanaian languages. Delivering her opening remarks, Prof. Helen Yitah, Dean of the School of Languages, welcomed all guests and participants to the event.

SCHOOL OF LANGUAGES COMMEMORATES UNESCO'S INTERNATIONAL MOTHER LANGUAGE DAY

In her speech, she stated that International Mother Language Day was part of a broader initiative to promote the preservation and protection of all mother languages used by different people in all parts of the world. As a result, the School of Languages has joined institutions worldwide to celebrate the Day to contribute to the realisation of the United Nations' 2019 Resolution of 2022-2032 as the Decade of Indigenous Languages. According to her, the move was timely, given the high energy generated globally around indigenous languages. The Dean further communicated the mother tongue's significance in education and urged all stakeholders to support the promotion and protection of indigenous languages for future generations.





In his welcome address, Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori, Provost of the College of Humanities, expressed his delight UNESCO commemorating International Mother Language Day on the UG campus. He warmly welcomed all quests and participants to the event and, on behalf of the College of Humanities, commended the School of Languages and the Ghana Commission for UNESCO for the initiative, which he mentioned is in line with the academic mandate of the School of Languages. Commenting on the theme, the Provost stated that the projection, promotion preservation of mother languages enhances multilingualism and cultural diversity for sustainable development and peaceful coexistence. Prof. Ofori applauded the School of Languages for leading in celebrating this important day and hailed the symposium as a welcome addition to the University of Ghana's calendar of activities, notably this year's, which marks the University's 75th Anniversary celebration. He hoped that the thoughtprovoking discussions would bring about further deliberations that would positively shape language and educational policies, which would, in turn, promote national

development. The Communications and Information Officer at the Ghana Commission for UNESCO, Ms. Agyekum Nsuroma, delivered a speech on behalf of the Secretary-General. She expressed the Commission's honour to mark the Day in collaboration with the School of Languages at the University of Ghana. She reiterated UNESCO's advocacy for multilingual education and stated that UNESCO's theme for this year's celebration is "Multilingual Education: A Necessity to Transform Education". She bemoaned the negative impact of institutional monolingualism in educational institutions globally, stating the adverse effect of the misconceptions surrounding using mother languages for classroom instruction in many African schools. She mentioned that there is a limitation in teaching and learning in institutions where English or French are the only acceptable languages of instruction. However, Ms. Agyekum Nsuroma applauded the School of Languages for taking a keen interest in promoting and preserving the mother tongue, stating that this will not only help in the intellectual development of children, but also promote communication with culture.

SCHOOL OF LANGUAGES COMMEMORATES WORLD ARABIC LANGUAGE DAY

The Arabic Section of the Department of Modern Languages, School of Languages, College of Humanities, in collaboration with the Royal Embassy of Saudi Arabia, Accra, has marked World Arabic Language Day. The Day, celebrated worldwide every 18th December since 2012, aims to project the Arabic language and its essential role in impacting knowledge through science and culture. In his welcome address, Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori, the Provost of the College of Humanities, highlighted the importance of the Arabic language when he narrated how the United Nations General Assembly on December 18th, 1973, adopted it as the sixth official language of the organization. Additionally, he intimated that the Arabic language is one of the most widely spoken languages globally, adding that, it is used daily by over 400 million people worldwide. This global reach has influenced the University of Ghana's long-standing tradition and history of teaching the Arabic language as a course at both the undergraduate and postgraduate levels







Speaking on the theme "The Role of Arabic Language in the Spread of Culture, Science and Knowledge", the Ambassador of the Royal Embassy of Saudi Arabia, Accra, H.E Meshal H. Al-Rogi, emphasized the significant role of the Arabic Language in impacting knowledge in society. He therefore reiterated his country's efforts in promoting the study of the Arabic language in schools. He indicated that the government of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia has since its formation supported the spread of the Arabic language through the granting of scholarships to enable individual applicants to study in Saudi Universities. He also added that the government of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia has recently increased its scholarship quota to Ghana to 159 scholarships annually. More importantly, H.E Meshal H. Al-Rogi concluded that the acquisition of the Arabic language by Ghanaians could serve as a catalyst that will strengthen the relationship between Ghana and all the twenty-two countries that have Arabic as their official language and also provide job opportunities to the teeming youth in Ghana.

The Departments of French and Modern Languages of the College of Humanities, University of Ghana's School of Languages have relaunched the multilingual translation office Transbureau. The Transbureau, which has been in operation since 2004, has been relaunched for the purpose of increasing its visibility and also to advertise its essential services in languages to society. The newly refurbished office of the Transbureau was hence launched at a brief ceremony chaired by Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori, Provost of the College of Humanities. Prof. Ildiko Csajbok-Twerefou, Head, Department of Modern Languages in her welcome address, stated that Language is the fabric that brings together human character, helps people to communicate, understand and relate with one another. Speaking on the Transbureau, Prof. Ildiko Csajbok-Twerefou, said that the Office plays a crucial role in the University of Ghana's agenda to ensure multilingual education. The Office also continues to uphold the values of accuracy in translation, cultural sensitivity and linguistic vibrance. Prof. Csajbok-Twerefou mentioned, that the relaunch marks the beginning of a journey to incorporate technology and innovation to assist in the delivery of the mandate of the Transbureau and to empower translators to continue to provide essential services to the University and beyond. She therefore entreated management of the Transbureau to continuously provide efficient service to society.





In delivering the Chairperson's remarks, Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori thanked all groups and individuals gathered for gracing the important ceremony. He expressed his pleasure at the special invitation to Chair the ceremony. Speaking on the University's commitment towards the study of languages for global development, the Provost stated that the University of Ghana runs six international courses in six international languages; and a pivotal player in this commitment is the Transbureau that has been rendering language services, facilitating communication and knowledge dissemination across various disciplines and communities in Ghana and the West African subregion.

SCHOOL OF LANGUAGES RELAUNCHES TRANSBUREAU

According to Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori, despite the essential services provided by the office over the years, there is still the need to do more. He mentioned that there is the need to make the Transbureau more visible and accessible, both within the University and outside and one of the ways to achieve this is by re-equipping the Office and relaunching it. The Provost concluded his remarks by commending the dedicated faculty who had played a role and continue to contribute towards the efficient running of the Office. On behalf of University Management and the College of Humanities, he thanked all the collaborators and all who made the ceremony a success. As part of making the office more visible, Management of the Transbureau also came up with a strategic plan which will ensure the promotion of multillingualism, enhancement of multicultural understanding, facilitation of academic collaboration and support for community engagement.





The Chairperson's speech was followed by a brief presentation by Management of the Transbureau. The presentation covered the history of the office, management, staff, services, languages, relevance of the office, its goals and prospects, challenges, as well as recommendations. The Transbureau provides services such as translation, interpretation, revision/editing, transcription, subtitling and voice over/dubbing in over eleven international languages, as well as Ghanaian languages. Management of the Transbureau expressed their gratitude to the Provost of the College of Humanities, their collaborators and all others who had contributed to the continuous running of the office. Prior to the official relaunch of the Transbureau, goodwill messages delivered by a number of the collaborators present. These include the Ghana Tertiary Education Commission (GTEC), International Programs Office (IPO) of the University of Ghana, a representative of the Provost of the College of Education and faculty members from the Department of French. The Transbureau was officially relaunched with a tape-cutting ceremony by the Provost.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH HOLDS LECTURE ON "THE EVOLUTION OF READING"



The College of Humanities, in collaboration with the Department of English, has organized the second in a series of public lectures as part of the College-level celebration of the University of Ghana's 75th anniversary. The lecture, which was titled "The Evolution of Reading in the Age of Digital Technology," was delivered by Michael Burke, a Prof. of Rhetoric at the University College Roosevelt/Utrecht University. The programme was chaired by Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori, Provost of the College of Humanities and was held on Wednesday, 31st May, 2023.

Prof. Burke's lecture was informed by observations from his work with a team of scholars on a project titled "Evolution of Reading in the Digital Age" and his book Literary Reading, Cognition and Emotion: An Exploration of the Oceanic Mind. He situated his discussion on contemporary reading practices within the history of reading, which he said began some 5000 years ago with the Sumerian Cuneiform script. Referencing the examples of the ancient libraries of Alexandria and Pergamon, Prof. Burke noted that in earlier times, reading was done aloud, not quietly. In the West, reading began with Christian books in monasteries, followed by the invention of the printing press. The invention of the paperback in the 1920s made it possible to sell cheaper and lighter books at train stations. Despite efforts to eliminate the book in contemporary times, bookshops continue to flourish offline and online. Reading is now in "a hybrid state of print and pixels," he said. Speculating about the future of reading, Prof. Burke highlighted the influence of digital technologies on text comprehension, human memory, and human emotion. He argued that digital readers are more likely to be overconfident about their comprehension abilities, especially



under pressure. This could lead to more skimming which would reduce people's ability to comprehend long-form informational text as they veer away from reading on paper to screens. For primary school children, the indiscriminate swapping of print, paper, and pencils for digital technologies may affect the development of reading comprehension and emerging critical thinking skills. Some suggested recommendations for responding to these challenges include the following: the school curriculum should include a dedicated time for reading paper books; strategies for deep reading on digital devices should also be taught; and finally, there should be interdisciplinary collaborations between policymakers, industry, as well as those in the human social and technical sciences. Prof. Burke concluded by speculating about "The Return of the Orator & the Storyteller" as technology advances. He argued that "We are already living in a voice-controlled, spoken technological world" and there are several advanced technological tools that can transcribe texts to voice and vice versa. Soon, people would do more listening than reading. Prof. Burke's presentation was followed by poetic performances by Miss Rosina Antwiwaa Dompreh and Mr. Jeffrey Baiden. An open discussion after the performances provided participants with the opportunity to ask questions and comment on issues covered during the lecture.

"With equipment








DEPARTMENT OF PHILOSOPHY AND CLASSICS HOSTS 2ND INTERNATIONAL CLASSICS CONFERENCE IN GHANA

The 2nd International Classics Conference in Ghana (ICCG) was a significant academic event organized by The Classical Association of Ghana, held from December 6 - 9, 2022. The conference theme "Global Classics and Africa" aimed to explore the intersection between classical studies and African perspectives, fostering discussions on the evolution of humanity and its relevance in the context of posthumanism. The conference was held at the Centre for Biodiversity Conservation Research (CBCR) and the Institute of Statistical, Social and Economic Research (ISSER) at the University of Ghana; and hosted by the Department of Philosophy and Classics. The success of the 2nd ICCG was made possible through the generous financial support of prominent organizations, including the Loeb Classical Library Foundation, the Society for the Promotion of Hellenic Studies, and the Society for Classical Studies. The event kicked off on Tuesday, December 6, 2022, with the Arrival and Registration session held at the Classics Section, Department of Philosophy and Classics, University of Ghana. The subsequent days included a rich program of academic sessions, keynote speeches, and opportunities for networking. Prof. Peter Kojo T. Grant, Acting President of the Classical Association of Ghana and Head of Classics and Philosophy at the University of Cape Coast delivered the welcome address. He was joined by Prof. Mohammed Majeed, Head of the Department of Philosophy & Classics at the University of Ghana. Professor Folake Onayemi, from the University of Ibadan, presented the keynote address and delivered a thought-provoking speech on "Classics, Humanity, and Posthumanism." The address examined the historical background of classical humanism and its relevance in understanding human identity and values. Moreover, Prof. Onayemi explored the critical challenges posed by the concept of posthumanism and emphasized how classical humanism could adapt and redefine itself through these challenges. The 2nd International Classics Conference in Ghana proved to be a resounding success, providing a platform for scholars, researchers, and students to engage in stimulating discussions on global classics and their connection to Africa. The event's hybrid format allowed for both inperson and virtual participation, enabling a wider and more diverse audience to be part of the academic discourse. The Classical Association of Ghana and the University of Ghana demonstrated their commitment to promoting classical studies in Africa, fostering intellectual growth and crosscultural exchanges in the realm of humanities.

The level 400 soil survey class undertook a field trip to the soil toposequence in the semi-deciduous forest near the University of Ghana Forest and Horticultural Crops Research Center in Okumaning, Kade on 23rd June, 2023. The visit to the site and subsequent laboratory exercise provided the students with a deeper understanding of soil toposequence and laboratory-based measurement experience. Similarly, students taking GEOG 468: Agriculture land use in the Developing World and GEOG 456: Rural Development Experience, also embarked on a field trip from 16th – 18th June 2023. The fieldwork focused on agricultural livelihoods and rural development issues in the Kassena-Nankana Municipality of the Upper East Region of Ghana. Students had the opportunity to visit Bonia, a farming community in Navrongo, collected data through focus group discussions with male and female farmers, did field observation by taking transect walks in the communities to identify the availability and physical state of social infrastructure like schools, clinics, and piped water.



The students also visited rice farms and drying fields, where they engaged in informal discussions with farmers about their activities and learnt how farmers controlled birds on the rice field. Finally, students visited the Tono Irrigation Scheme site, where they also observed the facility's scale, fishing activities and other livelihoods around the irrigation scheme. In all of these, group exercises are encouraged during and after the fieldtrips. Whilst these exercises enhance teamwork, it also improves social relations amonsgst and between students outside the lecture rooms.

ISSER Inclusive Finance Development Series (IIFDS), an initiative under the Institute's agenda to position African research institutions at the forefront of advancing evidence for the development of inclusive finance, was launched by Prof. Ernest Aryeetey, a former Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ghana and General Secretary of African Universities Research Alliance (ARUA) on May 4, 2023. The IIFDS is a platform dedicated to facilitating evidence-led engagement inclusive finance between academia, policymakers, commercial providers, and consumers. complements the Retail Finance Distribution (ReFinD), ISSER's subgrant awarding research initiative.







ReFinD Executive Director, Prof. Peter Quartey, said, "We at ISSER are committed to facilitating an African-led, independent, evidence-driven platform dedicated to generating and facilitating the use of evidence to advance and safeguard inclusive finance in developing economies, especially in Africa." The launch was marked with a public engagement on the 2021 Ghana Findex Data. It featured highlevel speakers including Mrs. Elsie Addo Awadzi, Second Deputy Governor of the Bank of Ghana (BoG), as keynote speaker, and Dr. Leora Klapper, a Lead Economist in the Development Research Group at the World Bank, a founder of the Global Findex database, Director of the 2022 World Development Report, as presenter of the 2021 Findex Data, alongside a representative five-member panel comprising key leaders from academia, the policy and regulatory sectors, and industry.

ISSER LAUNCHES SGER 2021, MAKES RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMF NEGOTIATIONS AND 2023 BUDGET

The Institute of Statistical Social and Economic Research (ISSER) has launched the State of the Ghanaian Economy Report (SGER) 2021, the 31st edition of its flagship annual report on the economy of Ghana. The report was launched by Mr. Edward Armah-Mensah, General Manager of Business, Agricultural Development Bank (ADB) Ghana, who represented Dr. John Kofi Mensah, Managing Director of ADB. He was assisted by Prof. Peter Quartey, ISSER Director; Prof. Gordon A. Awandare, Pro Vice-Chancellor, Academic and Student Affairs, University of Ghana (UG); Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori, Provost, College of Humanities, UG; and Dr. Isaac Osei-Akoto, Head of Economics Division, ISSER and Coordinator of SGER 2021.





In a statement read on his behalf by Mr. Armah Mensah, the ADB Managing Director expressed appreciation to ISSER for organizing the SGER launch each year, noting "this is an excellent opportunity for all stakeholders from different parts of the Ghanaian society to cross-pollinate ideas on our economy." Prof. Quartey gave a three-part presentation that covered the state of Ghana's economy in 2021, a review of quarter three 2022 economic performance, and Ghana's IMF journey, with each part concluding with key policy messages and recommendations.

ISSER, COLLABORATORS LAUNCH REPORT, ENGAGE STAKEHOLDERS ON PATHWAYS FOR GREENING GHANA'S COVID-19 RECOVERY

The scene at the dissemination workshop and project report launch was one of lively interactions as participants discussed the findings from the Ghana component of the 'Greening the Social and Economic Recovery in Ghana and Zambia' project. The 2-year study, carried out by research teams at the Institute of Statistical Social and Economic Research (ISSER), University of Ghana, the University College of London (UCL), UK, and the Zambia Institute for Policy Analysis and Research (ZIPAR), is a response to calls in the wake of Covid-19 to re-think the direction of economic and social development. As part of the project, the research team analysed stakeholder views on what a green recovery from Covid-19 could look like, co-developed future economy-wide scenarios with these stakeholders, analysed the energy system implications using quantitative models and developed recommendations for policymakers.





The Ghana report, named Greening the Recovery in Ghana report, was launched by ISSER Director, Prof. Peter Quartey, alongside project team members present. Besides the in-person participants, the launch was witnessed by online attendants, notably co-researchers and partners who contributed to the implementation of the project. Among other outcomes, the report recommends adopting a blended scenario or decarbonisation pathway based on the country's economic situation -- where the decision is taken to continue to invest in fossil fuel industries in the short term while increasing investment in green initiatives in the medium to long term, using resource taxes to ensure that the wealth is spread fairly and to generate funds for public investment in crucial social services.

YOUNG PEOPLE IN FOCUS: ISSER DEVELOPMENT DIALOGUE DISCUSSES TEENAGE PREGNANCY AND SCHOOL ENROLMENT

Teenage pregnancy prevention is fundamental to building a healthy, highly educated, happier, and more equitable society. This requires deliberate and consistent investment in reproductive health education, responsible parenting, family life education, and the involvement of everyone. This was the key message from the development dialogue on the topic of teenage pregnancy and school enrollment organised by the Institute of Statistical, Social and Economic Research (ISSER). It was led by the Social Division, one of the three divisions of the Institute that focuses on understanding people and society, identifying social problems, and promoting solutions to enhance societal welfare. Dr. Martha Awo, the Head of the Social Division, in sharing the motivation for the choice of topic, said adolescent pregnancies continue to be a serious public health concern in developing countries including Ghana. The dialogue was thus aimed at understanding the state of teenage pregnancy in Ghana and outlining recommendations to strengthen the capacity of policymakers and other stakeholder groups in tackling it.

The Maria Sibylla Merian Institute for Advanced Studies in Africa (MIASA) in collaboration with the Centre for Gender Studies and Advocacy (CEGENSA) and the German Historical Institute Paris (GHIP), on Thursday, 16th February 2023, held a public round table discussion on the theme, "Positioning and Preparing Oneself for Leadership in Academia". The wellattended event held at the J.H.K. Nketia Conference Hall at the Institute of African Studies and online via Zoom, saw distinguished female academics share their leadership experiences in academia over the years. Delivering the keynote address, the Provost of the College of Humanities, Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori, warmly welcomed all participants, both online and in-person,



the event. He expressed his excitement at the continued efforts by MIASA, CEGENSA and GHIP in driving the female empowerment agenda of the University of Ghana. 

The Centre for Gender Studies and Advocacy (CEGENSA) was set up by the Council of the University of Ghana in 2005 and launched in March 2006. The Centre was set up to carry out the following functions: to institutionalise gender as a legitimate business of the University; promote research on gender-related provide documentation on, and issues: dissemination of, gender-related research; provide services and facilities to meet some of the unique needs of female staff and students; promote advocacy and initiate policies on gender in the University; generate linkages with, and provide extension work on, gender with key stakeholders in government, NGOs, civil society and the donor community. Our mission is to create an interdisciplinary space that positions CEGENSA as a leader in key areas of university policy making as well as in curriculum development and service provision.

CEGENSA AND PARTNERS LAUNCH THE UNIVERSITY OF GHANA GENDER POLICY

As part of the UG@75 activities, the Centre for Gender Studies and Advocacy, in collaboration with the Office of the Registrar and Public Affairs Directorate, launched the University of Ghana Gender Policy. The University of Ghana Gender Policy, which is in line with Strategic Objective Four on Diversity and Inclusivity seeks to enshrine gender equality in all aspects of the institutional culture of the University of Ghana. In her welcome address, Dr. Deborah Atobrah indicated among other things that it was important to listen to the perspectives of students because even though they formed the larger population of stakeholders, they were at the bottom of the hierarchy making them easily vulnerable. She added that the forum was equally important because it provided a platform for communication to address certain misconceptions about what gender policies seek to do. On her part, Ms Patricia Blankson Akakpo stated that NETRIGHT-Ghana was on a quest to strengthen young women's agency and provide safe spaces for them to identify their "power within", discuss their issues, interrogate policies and set their own agenda to effect change.





After the opening remarks, the Chair for the occasion, Ms. Eugenia Selasie Seadey was introduced. In her remarks she expressed her appreciation to the Director of CEGENSA for the invitation to chair the programme. She indicated that gender equity was not merely a "buzzword" but an essential principle that should permeate every aspect of society. She commended the University of Ghana for the tremendous efforts made in fostering a gender equitable environment over the past years which has led to outstanding females occupying top management positions at the University. She noted that although much has been done to promote gender equity in the University, the work is far from complete since there are still barriers and challenges that need to be addressed. She believed that as students, their perspectives were invaluable in identifying areas where inclusivity and gender equity could be enhanced. Ms. Cythia Sunu, Senior Programme Officer at NETRIGHT gave a presentation on Mobilizing for Women's Rights; the Role of NETRIGHT. After her presentation, a sketch was performed by the School of Performing Arts.

The UG Centre for Gender Studies and Advocacy hosted former President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf of Liberia and the team from the Ellen Johnson Sirleaf Presidential Center, for a discussion on women's access to public leadership roles, highlighting the importance of advancing women's leadership and exploring ways to promote gender equality and women's empowerment in leadership roles. Aimed at inspiring the next generation of female leaders in Ghana, the discussants, Dr. Zanetor Agyeman-Rawlings, MP for Klottey Korle Constituency; Madam Yawa Hansen-Quao, Social Entrepreneur and Leadership Advocate and Dr. Grace Avensu-Danguah, Medical Director and Humanitarian Surgeon shared their experiences and leadership journeys. They utilised the Question-and-Answer session to interact with the audience on how to promote equity, particularly in governance.





Former President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf expressed her delight to be in Ghana and urged the young ladies to forge ahead in their respective fields. Prof. Nana Aba Appiah Amfo, Vice-Chancellor, also stated the importance of working harder as women to bring each other up. At the end of the event, participants noted with satisfaction their desire for more of such programmes to be organised.

The theme for this year's celebration was, 'Resilience of Older Persons in a Changing World.' The Centre organized and observed this august day in collaboration with its noble partners, namely, the World Health Organization, UNFPA, Ghana Health Service, the Samuel Amo Tobbin Foundation, Gully Hill Pond, Restorative Justice for Oakland Youth, Los Abuelos Foundation, and Quality Insurance Company Limited. Other agencies and individuals who supported the organization of this event included Walk with Pearls, Dr. Agrawal Eye Clinic,

This event was attended by over 500 persons, with approximately more than half of them being older persons. She added that the theme for this year's celebration was relevant as it sought to remind all of us about the important role older people play in traversing global difficulties and contributing to their remedies with fortitude and strength. Dr. Akosua Agyemang and Dr. Vyda Mamley Hervie, moderators of the event, a Senior Lecturer, and CFAS management committee member, opened the event by welcoming all present and introducing them to the activities of the day. Rev. Prof. Akye Essuman was invited afterwards to deliver an opening prayer before the official commencement of the programme. In her welcome address, the Director of the Centre for Ageing Studies, Prof. Mavis Dako-Gyeke expressed her gratitude to the audience for attending the programme and encouraged them to recognize and appreciate older persons for the immense contributions they have made towards the development of society. In his remarks, the Founding Director of CFAS, Prof. Charles Mate-Kole also highlighted the relevance of older persons in society and called on relevant stakeholders to continue advocating for appropriate interventions that would enhance their wellbeing.







During the ceremony, Rev. Prof. Akye Essuman and Prof. Matilda Steiner-Aseidu were invited to deliver brief lectures on the topics, 'Ageing, Health and Wellness' and 'Ageing and Nutrition' respectively. Additionally, Mr. Daniel Opoku, a physiotherapist at the University of Ghana Hospital, provided a brief presentation on the spine, as well as proper sitting and sleeping habits that could prevent persons, especially older people from damaging their spines. Representatives from the various partner organizations took turns to provide their solidarity messages, all of which emphasised the importance of making society a safe haven for older persons.

CFAS ORGANISES PROGRAMME ON ROLE OF YOUTH IN PROMOTING HEALTHY AGEING

As part of its activities to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of the University of Ghana, the Centre for Ageing Studies (CFAS) organised an event "Promoting Healthy Ageing Contemporary Society: Role of the Youth". Prof. Mavis Dako-Gyeke, Director of CFAS in a speech, expressed her gratitude to all attendees and urged them to pay keen attention to the presentations, as well as ask questions and make contributions when necessary. The Chairman for the event, Mr. Charles Amo Tobbin also thanked CFAS for organising the programme, recognising that it has created an avenue for the deliberation on how young people could support older persons. Prof. Daniel Frimpong Ofori, Provost of the College of Humanities, added that issues of healthy ageing are gradually gaining



attention in contemporary society; hence, it was essential that the youth and older people work together towards ensuring healthy ageing. Four presentations were delivered during the programme. The first presentation was given by Rev. Dr. Samuel Ayete-Nyampong of the Trinity Theological Seminary, Accra. In his delivery, Rev. Dr. Ayete-Nyampong emphasised that supporting older persons was a crucial Christian value that accrues blessings for young people. He added that the way the youth treat older persons would determine how they would be treated when they also grow old. The second presentation was delivered by Dr. Haruna Zagoon-Sayeed (Department for the Study of Religions, University of Ghana) on Islam and Care for the Elderly. He likewise shared that caring for older persons is engrained in Islamic doctrines and it was a way of showing respect and appreciation to this vulnerable population.





In the third presentation, Dr. Alice Boateng (Department of Social Work, University of Ghana), posited that supporting older persons was a core cultural value in the Ghanaian setting, and was also a crucial way of promoting social connectedness and intergenerational support in society. Therefore, it is important that the youth engage the elderly to ascertain their needs and support them accordingly. In the final presentation, Mr. Kwamina Abekah-Carter from CFAS shared that it would be useful if the support that the University community renders to older persons is guided by the values of the University of Ghana, as it is a way of promoting the image and prestige of the University in the larger society. Some stakeholders of CFAS, including Tobinco Foundation, UNESCO, and Nero Aged Care, among others took turns to deliver solidarity messages. Following this, a youth club named Youth Advocates for the Elderly (YAFTE) was launched by Rev. Korkor Hammond of the Presbyterian Church of Ghana.

The Centre for Urban Management Studies (CUMS), College of Humanities was established in 2016. Its main objective is to provide a comprehensive and multi-disciplinary setting for conducting innovative research, teaching and public outreach activities on the management of the urban built environment. Partnerships between universities and communities have long been recognised as a vehicle for solving problems and promoting community development in general. Consequently, the Centre seeks to keenly engage with academics, policy-makers and practitioners of the urban built environment on a wide variety of issues including urban policy, planning and governance; urban economy and informality; urban development, crime and security; urban environmental management and policy; urban housing and slum upgrading strategies; urban poverty and inequalities; urban infrastructure financing strategies; urban transport and urban health.

COLLABORATIONS AT THE CENTRE FOR URBAN MANAGEMENT STUDIES (CUMS)

During the 2022/2023 academic year, the Centre collaborated with the Pro-Poor Urban Development Research Cluster. Centre for Sustainable Housing and Development, and the University of Lagos, Nigeria to host an online seminar titled, "Leave no One Behind: From Concept to Action in African Cities". This attracted a global audience and presenters from academia (including Dr. Fedelia Ohemeng of the Department of Sociology, University of Ghana), UN-HABITAT and civil society groups. The Centre also established a collaboration with the Making Africa Urban (MAU) research team led by Prof. George Owusu, founding Director of CUMS to engage in knowledge dissemination through seminars. This is aimed at building the capacity of members who are mostly doctoral students and postdoctoral fellows.

WORKSHOP ON LAND USE STRESSES ON URBAN ENVIRONMENT HELD IN ACCRA, GHANA

This workshop, held on March 25, 2022 at the Cedi Conference Centre, sought to explore the dynamics of environmental change and associated pollution in the Greater Accra Metropolitan Area (GAMA). The workshop's overarching objective was to gather participants' perspectives on the extent to which GAMA is creating resilience in the face of increasing landuse-induced environmental pollution. It was funded by UKRI and GCRF partnership funds through the African Research Universities Alliance (ARUA) Centre of Excellence (COE), University of Lagos. Representatives from government institutions, academia, development practitioners, and opinion leaders from various communities attended the event. Prof. Daniel Ofori, Provost, of the College



of Humanities in delivering his opening remarks emphasised the importance of the event for national development. The workshop led to unearthing the pathways of land use-induced environmental pollution, as well as the manifestations of risk and vulnerability in disproportionately polluted urban communities. Moreover, it provided insights into the existing institutional framework and innovative approaches to addressing the effects of poor urban environmental quality.



The overall outcome of this event was the production of a scoping study report titled: 'Urban Resilience in Africa: A Scoping Study of Land Use Stresses on Urban Environment in Accra, Ghana'. The scoping study also resulted in the publication of an article in the African Journal of Housing and Sustainable Development (Vol 4, No 2, 2023).

WORKSHOP ON LAND USE STRESSES ON URBAN ENVIRONMENT HELD IN ACCRA, GHANA



The Centre hosted a two-day (30th - 31st March 2023) multi-stakeholder workshop on the theme, 'Mainstreaming Sidewalks in Road Transport Infrastructural Development in Ghana.' This was in partnership with the Pro-Poor Development Cluster of the Centre for Housing and Sustainable Development, University of Lagos, Nigeria. The workshop was part of the University of Ghana's 75th-anniversary celebrations and the African Research Network for Urbanisation and Habitable Cities' (AR-NUHC) series of activities this year. AR-NUHC is made up of ten African universities from Nigeria, Ghana, Sierra Leone, The Gambia, South Africa, Uganda, and Zambia. It is coordinated by the African Research Universities Alliance (ARUA) Centre of Excellence (CoE) at the University of Lagos' Centre for Housing and Sustainable Development.

The workshop was funded by UKRI and GCRF partnership funds through the ARUA COE, University of Lagos. Academics from Ghana, Nigeria, and the Gambia, as well as practitioners and policymakers, attended the workshop to discuss the mainstreaming of sidewalks in Ghana and, by extension, other African countries where sidewalks are lacking. Presentations were given by Dr. Samuel Sasu-Mensah (MTTD, Ghana Police Service), Mrs Perpertual Akoto Ofori (National Road Safety Authority), Mr. Mohammed Alhassan Damba (President, Ghana Institute of Planners), Dr. Collins Adjei-Mensah (University of Cape Coast), Vida Nyawornota (University of Ghana), Dr. Olasunmbo Olusanya (University of Lagos, Nigeria), and Dr. Victor Onifade (University of Lagos, Nigeria).
